The purpose of this document is to provide a list of thesis topics I am willing to supervise and to help you come up with ideas of your own. Note that I am willing to supervise topics not listed here—I will be happy to discuss any idea. I have a couple of general remarks that may help you make decisions that have to be made before you start writing:

- I strongly recommend writing your thesis in English using \LaTeX . Even though you may encounter some problems along the way, it is the easiest way to write a thesis. Plus, mastering \LaTeX is a very valuable skill.
- Given the thesis length requirement set by IES, it is often useful to consider splitting your thesis into multiple chapters made up by individual (but related) papers. This will help you to publish your work afterwards more easily, because academic journals usually have an upper limit on word count much smaller than the IES minimal requirement for theses.
